town is in a good place. We are strong financially, we have a great and dedicated staff, well constructed and maintained facilities, and elected officials who will continue to care for Riga for many years to come.


Thank you again for honoring me with the opportunity to serve our community. I look forward to seeing you around town as "citizen Bob".

RIGA HIGHWAY HAPPENINGS



Clearing snow from fire hydrants

As we move forward from the holidays into the start of another new year, winter season is now in full swing. Your highway department has installed 5 miles of snow fence, readied plowing and salting equipment for the coming winter, and remains vigilant, around the clock, watching weather forecasts and radar to be ready for the next weather event. The late arrival of winter has allowed us to work on the removal of hazardous, dead, or declining trees, and trimming of branches hanging over our roads.

Planned work - summer of 2016

Town Roads:

Jenkins Road and North Johnson will be surface-treated this summer. **Bovee Road** is scheduled for true and leveling. On **South Sanford Road** we plan to mill edges and add base to the edges to widen. Tree work, drainage work, ditch cleaning, and culvert repair will commence prior to any paving to drain water away from road shoulders and road beds.

County Roads: I have been told that decisions and commitments by the county for work on county roads will not be made until early spring.

As we continually maintain town equipment throughout the seasons, please remember we also need to be diligent with our personal vehicles. Please check the tread on tires, tire pressure, antifreeze, wipers, belts hoses, and lights on your vehicles. It is hard to believe with the warm sunny November and December that winter is actually here. We all know that variable conditions are likely in our region. Good tread depth is required for starting as well as stopping. All season tires are sold as adequate for winter, but good aggressive winter snow tires will always provide highly superior traction for starting, stopping, and holding the road. Proper footwear with good tread is also a good idea as icy spots can be encountered on walkways, driveways and many parking areas. In every case, whether walking, driving, or approaching intersections, please slow down.

The big thing I would like our community to be aware of with snow removal is that there are real people performing a real service, often under unrelenting conditions. Their work is done during all hours of the day and night, including being away from families on holidays. Snow plowing and salting can be long, tiring, and often thankless work. Complaints and frustration can be common when snow is frequent. As we monitor how we provide service, and listen to residents and our highway employees, we consistently look to make improvements where necessary.

Please remember to keep your headlights on, even when it is snowing lightly, and even after sunrise. Your vehicle is much more visible to other drivers and our snow plow drivers who might be turning the trucks around in intersections to make the return trip down the other side of the road. While our goal is to make sure no one is inconvenienced due to winter weather, it is simply not always possible. Our staff will continue to work diligently to make our roads as safe as possible.

Your highway department maintains 150 lane miles of road in the winter. Our highest attention is always given to highly traveled state highways; secondly to county roads; and lastly our many town roads.

Each of our 4 plow drivers and trucks need at least 3 hours to complete the assigned routes of 35 to 40 miles, with an average 2 to 4 inch snowfall. When heavy snow is falling and wind is blowing, times will be extended as travel is slower and cleaning intersections takes multiple passes. One of our frustrations is when snow begins falling after 4 or 5 am, when normal call in time is 3 am. It is impossible to cover the entire town by 7 or 8 am when routes are started at 5 or 6 am. Our goal is to provide save passable roads, but timing and variables of temperature, wind, rate of precipitation, lake effect, make each snow or ice event somewhat unique.





NEWS FROM THE ASSESSORS OFFICE

I know I am repeating what has been written in the past, but it is still important to keep in mind that **ALL EXEMPTION APPLICATIONS** must be filed with me by the Taxable Status Date of **MARCH 1, 2016**. If you have moved since last March 1st and the prior owner had exemptions, unless you apply for your own exemptions by March 1st, the prior owner's exemptions will be removed. If you are a homeowner, there could even be taxes you may have to pay back.

Enhanced STAR renewal applications were sent out in September. To be eligible for this increased exemption from school taxes, you must be a resident homeowner who **will be at least 65 in 2016 (born before December 31, 1951)**, and whose **income is no more than \$84,550 on your 2014 tax return that was filed last April**. If you are currently receiving Basic STAR, or if you are a new homeowner and meet these criteria, you should contact me to see if you may be eligible for this increased exemption

from school taxes.

The Low Income Senior Citizen Exemption renewals were mailed out on December 1st. You must be 65 before the end of 2016 and meet the income requirement, which includes Social Security including Medicare. The State, County, Town, and Village have a maximum income of \$37,399.99 to be eligible for any percent of this exemption; the school district maximum is different in each of the three districts in Riga.

Basic STAR has no age requirement, but the income requirement is \$500,000 or less. This does not have to be renewed. If you are the resident owner, you are eligible, but you must apply.

If you live in the mobile home park, own your mobile home, will still be living there on March 1, 2016, and you do not have a STAR exemption on file, please call me. Since we do not receive deeds or notice of transfers for residents of the park, it is up to you to file an application with me.

Agricultural renewal applications were sent out in November, as were Clergy, Non-Profit, and Disabled with Limited Income.

As you may be aware, the Town Board has passed a local law allowing a Cold War Veterans Exemption. This is for those who served during a non-war period on active duty -- not just for training purposes -- and were honorably discharged.

There is also an exemption for disabled persons with lower incomes. The law was changed to make it possible for **disabled veterans** to qualify for this exemption, if their income so allows. If you are a disabled veteran and think you may qualify, please contact me.

TAX COLLECTION INSTRUCTIONS

I will be mailing the 2016 Town & County tax bills out by January 1st, and will be collecting from the beginning of January to the end of May.

Full Payment instructions:

Jan. 1–Feb. 10: Pay the total amount of tax bill to Kimberly Pape, Tax Collector

Feb. 11-May 31: Pay the total tax amount plus interest to Kimberly Pape, Tax Collector

Interest Schedule

February 11-28	1.5%
March 1-31	3%
April 1-30	4.5 %
May 1-31	6%

New Installment Payment Instructions:

The first installment **must** be paid by February 10th. If first installment is not paid by February 10, total bill plus interest is due.

Jan.1–Feb 10: Pay 1st installment to Kimberly Pape, Tax Collector. Any payment on or before February 10 is interest free.

Feb.11-Feb. 29: 2nd installment due with 1 ½% interest to Kimberly Pape, Tax Collector.

Mar. 1–Mar. 31: 3rd installment due with 3% interest. If 2nd installment was not paid by Feb. 28,

both the 2nd and 3rd installments are due with 3% interest. Payment is made to Kimberly Pape, Tax Collector.

Apr. 1-Apr. 30: 4th installment due with 4.5% interest. If prior installments are not paid by respective due dates, all installments shall be paid as one unit with 4.5% interest.

Obtaining A New York State Dog License

It is a state law, as well as a Town Ordinance, that all dogs 4 months and older must have a current NYS dog license. A dog license may be obtained at the Riga Town Offices during regular business hours, or you can apply by mail. To have a dog license application mailed to you, please call me at 293-3880 Ex121. In order to license your dog, you will need to provide a valid rabies certificate and a spay/neuter certificate, if applicable. The fee is \$9.00 for altered dogs and \$17.00 for un-altered dogs. If you have any questions, please call me at the above number.

Attention Multiple Dog Owners
