Supervisor's Report

Our Highway Department has been busy with many projects this summer, including tending to our roads. continue to work cooperatively with Monroe County and our neighboring towns on various road projects here in Riga and elsewhere. Sharing services equipment with neighboring communities allows us to reduce our costs and complete projects we might

not have been able to do otherwise. This is a win-win situation for all involved.

you Hopefully noticed the improvements to some of the Sanford Road athletic

fields. Construction of an additional baseball/softball field is moving along nicely and should be completed soon. Special thanks to our highway department employees for their help with this project.

The Town Board will soon begin preparations to develop the 2020 Budget. This process begins by requesting departments all and interested parties to prepare their Budget requests for the upcoming year for Board review. The Board spends a significant amount of time reviewing each department's requests. Two full days (and a third if necessary) are devoted to meeting with department heads and other entities the Town uses to provide services. Each budget line is reviewed to be sure budget requests are properly justified. After we have met with all interested parties and have discussed their requests, the Board develops a tentative budget. The Town Board then reviews this document and makes any necessary adjustments. At this point, the Board moves it to a Preliminary Budget. A public hearing is scheduled to give the public an opportunity to comment on the proposed Preliminary Budget. Once the public hearing has been completed, the Board can make additional changes as needed before adopting the final Budget. I am thankful for level the commitment everyone involved in the

SMOKE **ALARMS** SAVE LIVES

- ⇒ Place smoke alarms on every level of your home, outside every bedroom.
- ⇒ Test smoke alarms monthly.
- ⇒ Vacuum alarms annually to remove dust and cobwebs.
- ⇒ Replace old alarms. Smoke alarms ten years old and older need to be replaced.
- ⇒ Alarms should never be disconnected. **Batteries** should never be removed for other uses.
- ⇒ Replace the battery every year. Better yet, twice a yearwhen you change the clocks in the spring and fall.

- ⇒ Carbon monoxide is the leading cause of accidental poisoning deaths in the United States.

- ⇒ CO is produced anytime a fuel is burned. Potential sources include gas or oil furnaces, water heaters, space heaters, dryers, barbecue clothes grills, fireplaces, wood-burning stoves, ovens. gas generators, and car exhaust fumes. (please remember to have your heating appliances serviced annually)
- Most CO incidents happen during the winter months, mainly due to an increased use in fuel burning appliances.
- At high concentration levels in ⇒ carbon monoxide can be fatal CO minutes. rapidly accumulates in the blood and is attracted to the hemoglobin in your bloodstream. When breathed in, CO passes through the lungs and bonds with hemoglobin, displacing the oxygen that cells need to function

Batteries don't belong in your household recycling

So where do they go when their time is up?

According to the NYS Department of Environmental ecopark/batteries.php. Conservation, it's safe to dispose of single-use

alkaline batteries in the trash. Because rechargeable batteries contain toxic heavy metals, it dispose illegal to them trash. Manufacturers are also required to provide free collection and recycling for certain types of rechargeable batteries.

Button and rechargeable batteries - like those found in drills, laptops, hearing aids, watches etc.- can be brought to the ecopark for recycling, keeping heavy metals out of the environment (single-use alkaline are accepted at ecopark). batteries NOT Rechargeable batteries can also be brought to a number of retailers including Lowes, Home Depot, Best Buy, Staples, and Batteries Plus Bulbs. In 2018, 323 reported fires occurred at waste facilities across the US and Canada, some injuring workers and firefighters. Many of those fires may have resulted from improperly disposing of rechargeable batteries in household recycling bins where they don't belong. High School Graduation




This year's 2019 graduating class of the Churchville-Chili High School has the distinct

pleasure of being the 69th class graduation since the creation of the centralized school district on May 23, 1950. Stepping back in time we can briefly trace the evolution of the Town of Riga High Schools and even take a glimpse at its first graduating class as told by one of its members.



Prior to 1950 and after 1936, the Riga School district consisted of numerous one-room houses and a High School that that we now call the Churchville Elementary School on West Buffalo Street. That High School consisted of grades K-12 and was built in 1936 as a Works Progress Administration Project during the Great Depression at a cost of \$237,000.00.



Highschool that is now the Churchville Elementary School West Buffalo St

across the street from the present Churchville Elementary -dav School on or near #37 & #39 West Buffalo Street. Built at a cost of \$25,000.00 this facility replaced the Cobblestone School House which still stands today at the rear of the present-day Methodist Church. Classes taught at this facility were grades K-12 with a special program in agriculture. Outside the Village, the Town of Riga still had one room schoolhouses and at one time had nearly 27 separate schoolhouses. It was not until 1956 that all one room schoolhouse in the Churchville-Chili School District closed forever.

Courses taught at the High School first Regent exam were found in an 1897 Annual Cobblestone Report of the Regents of the State examinations were held this year of New York and listed as follows: for the first time in the Churchville "English, German, French, Latin, Union School, Papers as follows mathematics to solid geometry, were sent to Albany: Reading 8, English and American History, writing 9, spelling 20, elementary physiology and hygiene, physical English 7, arithmetic 6, Algebra 2 bookkeeping geometry, drawing. Originally built as a one room schoolhouse 1843 in Churchville Cobblestone School House became the first dedicated High School for the Town of Riga. According to the available records, the first graduating class of the High School was in 1893 araduatina and the class consisted three female of students: Gertuda Moule, Incz Green and Carrie Randall. This in comparison to the 326 students of the class of 2019. It was not until December of 1894 that the Cobblestone High School received Regents Certification therefore this graduation class was non-Regents. 


